## **Investing in Services to Help Struggling Families**

The Community Services Block Grant (CSBG) provides States with the stable, flexible funding required to deliver comprehensive, locally designed strategies to reduce poverty.

CSBG-funded organizations, most of which are Community Action Agencies (CAAs), leverage and coordinate additional federal, state, local and private resources to deliver comprehensive anti-poverty services to help the nation's poorest families achieve greater economic security. Services include job placement and training, early education and child care, food assistance, housing services, transportation, health care and other programs that foster self-sufficiency. The CSBG Network invests in promising practices that not only improve people's lives, but change conditions in struggling communities.

### **Investing in Economic Recovery**

CSBG ARRA funds bolstered economic recovery in communities throughout the country through job retention and creation, as well as services for families suffering economic hardship caused by the recession. States and CAAs used their knowledge of local community needs and rapidly created new initiatives to address critical community problems.

These projects have resulted in a double bottom line return by improving communities and providing income and dignity for unemployed Americans.
