Introduction

The Community Services Block Grant (CSBG) funds a network of States and local Community Action Agencies (CAAs) who help individuals and families overcome economic insecurity. The data for the CSBG Network were gathered by the CSBG Information System (CSBG IS) Survey, a system for State reporting that is administered by the National Association for State Community Services Programs (NASCSPP) and supported by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS), Office of Community Services (OCS). All 52 CSBG grantees (referred to as “States”) responded to the FY 2010 CSBG IS Survey, including 50 States, the District of Columbia, and Puerto Rico.

CSBG is a federal investment and a national commitment to reduce poverty in our nation. It uses a local delivery infrastructure able to respond to the national problems that cause poverty. CSBG is administered at the state and territory level. This allows administrators to tailor their anti-poverty efforts to address area-specific problems and capitalize on the unique resources in their states. State and territory CSBG administrators coordinate with other federal, state, and local programs, improving efficiency, access, and results for low-income individuals and communities. Administration at the state level also provides robust accountability and oversight of CSBG and tracking metrics such as employment, education, housing, and health.

The State Fact Sheets showcase the results and outcomes produced by the CSBG Network in Fiscal Year (FY) 2010. Each state and CAA overcomes unique challenges in their fight to end poverty to provide the best services and programs to low-income individuals, families, and communities. CSBG gives the network the tools they need to address today’s economic concerns and create a better future for vulnerable communities and struggling Americans. The State Fact Sheets tell a portion of this story by providing a better understanding of demographics of individuals and families served, linkages and partnerships, uses of CSBG funds, and the conditions of poverty reduced or eliminated due to CSBG and the State.
