Missouri Celebrates National Weatherization Day

October 30 marks National Weatherization Day, and the Show Me State is showing its support. Governor Jay Nixon signed a proclamation declaring October 30, 2014, as Weatherization Day in Missouri. In honor of this designation, several home demonstrations are scheduled in the state:

In addition to these demonstrations, the state's Low-Income Weatherization Assistance Program will host a booth at the Harry S. Truman Building, 301 W. High Street in Jefferson City, on October 30 during normal business hours (8 a.m. to 5 p.m.).

National Weatherization Day was conceived as a means to focus local, state, and national attention on the program and the work being performed by dedicated members of the Weatherization Assistance Program (WAP) network. Since 1977, the Low-Income Weatherization Assistance Program in Missouri has provided cost-effective, energy-efficient home improvements to Missouri's low-income households. The program aims to lower utility bills and improve comfort while ensuring health and safety.
