


Issue	Families Touched/Year	Program Provides Home Visits or Repairs
Health	1800	Asthma, Lead Poisoning, Head Start, Home Visiting
Housing	<500	Housing Rehab, Lead Hazard Control
Energy	1800 (1,000 low income)	Weatherization, Utility-Funded Energy Upgrades





- Developed Health Housing and Energy Efficiency Check Up Forms
- Piloted in Manchester and Belknap Merrimack CAP -- > 90 Homes
- Manchester: asthma, health visiting, lead, housing rehab, Weatherization
- Belknap Merrimack: Head Start, Weatherization
- Strongly embraced by programs
- Adds 15 minutes per visit
- Resulted in significant referrals








- 95 units
- Nine partnering agencies
- 127 referrals
- Adds 15 minutes to each home visit
- Referrals tracked on Google.docs



% of Manchester Units Spurring Referrals






- City is completed HH Strategic Plan

Opportunities for Improvement


- Google.docs is blocked by IT personnel of key partners
- Need further partner education to ensure successful referrals

Initial enthusiasm for some partners is wearing





- MOU among Health, Housing, and Weatherization for HH & EE referrals
- Lead to track referrals
- Lead One Touch Subgrants
- MCH home visits to complete HH assessments & referrals
- NH Housing to integrate HH and EE with housing assessments
- Head Start to encourage HH & EE referrals





HH Repair Commitments

 Lead Poisoning Prevention, Housing Rehab, MCH -- identify and leverage funds for HH and EE work



- WX to add moisture and pest repairs to audits and work practices, pending
 - IPM pilot with air sealing demonstrates costeffective work <\$40/home

The reEnergize Program

- Joint effort between Omaha & Lincoln
 - One of 17 programs in the nation
 - \$10 million Energy Efficiency and Conservation Block Grant
 - \$50 million investment by local organizations
- Implementation
 - January 2011 May 2013
 - 3,193 Residential Upgrades
 - 263 Commercial Upgrades

Omaha Progress

- HH Checklists done in >401 units
- 45 min/unit as initial reEnergize site visit
 - 105 units generated 2 or more referrals (26% of all units)
 - 83 units generated 1 referral (21% of all units)
 - 214 units did not generate a referral (53% of all units)
 - 376 total referrals were generated
