

## Fresno County and Asthma






- 6,000 annual emergency room visits

## Education & Weatherization Coordination

Energy Assistance Screens Eligible Clients.

Educator reviews completed HH project file, ensuring completeness.

The HH educator coordinates with the Weatherization, Pb and renovation auditors on suggested HH improvements to be implemented during the energy efficiency, Pb and renovation retrofits.

HH Educator visits client, creates targeted action plan, and provides Do-It-Yourself HH items.

#### **Example: Asthma Mitigation in Fresno**

#### I. identify

#### **Target Population**

1,100 children with asthma emergencies related to home-based environmental triggers

#### **Savings Opportunity**

\$17.1 million (medical costs pre-intervention)

\$10.8 million (medical costs post-intervention\*)

= \$6.3 million opportunity (37% savings)

#### Financial Stakeholders

1. Medi-Cal: \$3 mil. projected savings

2. Employers: \$2.3 mil. projected savings

3. HC Providers: \$1 mil. projected savings






## Estimated Deaths from Indoor Air exposure in CA

## Carbon Monoxide 23 preventable deaths




## CO Poisoning from Combustion Appliance Backdrafting





## Carbon Monoxide Non-lethal effects



Effects: undiagnosed heart problems, headache, flu-like symptoms... chronic effects include lethargy, headaches, concentration problems, amnesia, dementia, psychosis, Parkinsonism, memory impairment, personality alterations, signs of parietal dysfunction, and other minor symptoms. For exposed mothers: low birth weight babies and pre-term births.

Energy Retrofit/Weatherization Activities in CA




## LIEE – Low Income Energy Efficiency, aka Energy Savings Assistance Program - CA

- Rate Payer funded, overseen by the CPUC
- Implemented by the Investor-owned utilities (IOUs)
- Provides no-cost weatherization services to low-income households who meet the <u>CARE</u> income guidelines

| Household Size  | LIEE Income Limit |
|-----------------|-------------------|
| 1 to 2          | \$31,800          |
| 3               | \$37,400          |
| 4               | \$45,100          |
| 5               | \$52,800          |
| 6               | \$60,500          |
| Each additional | \$7,700           |

## LIHEAP/WAP – Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program/Weatherization Assistance Program – Federal

- Funding from HHS and DOE
- Administered by CA Dept. of Community Services and Development
- Implemented by 28 Community Service Providers
- Provides no-cost weatherization services to low-income households who meet the LIHEAP/WAP income eligibility guidelines



### LIHEAP/WAP 2008 Stats

Percent of Income U.S. Families Spend on Energy: 3.5%

Percent of Income Low-Income Families Spend on Energy: 14%

Number of Homes Weatherized 20,623

Average Energy Investment \$1,294

Average Annual Savings \$418
