# NASCSP QCI Survey Report Spring 2016





#### **Summary of Results**

#### Introduction

In the Spring of 2016, NASCSP put out a survey to the 56 WAP grantees (50 States, D.C., 5 Territories). The purpose of the survey was to get a better idea of how the Department of Energy's QCI requirements has been implemented by states. NASCSP received responses from 34 grantees for a response rate of about 61%. Grantees from all five of NASCSP's organizational regions provided feedback giving the results a significant amount of geographic diversity.

Three of the respondents did not consent for their responses to be shared (Question #2). Their de-identified responses are factored into general graphs and statistics; however, none of their individual comments or open ended answers are included in this report. The comments and open ended answers of respondents who did consent to sharing are unedited.

The questions asked in the survey fall under four general themes: Costs, Tracking, Employee Issues, and General feedback. Each subsection below summarizes the results pertaining to each theme. Clicking on question titles will take you directly to the full results for that question

#### 1. Cost

Question #3 asked: How much on average does your state pay for contracted QCI work? Over 75% of respondents indicated that QCI inspection cost \$550 or less. About 23% of respondents paid more than \$550. In Question #4 respondents were asked: What do you consider a reasonable price to pay for contracted QCI work? Similarly, about 77% felt that \$550 or less was a reasonable fee to pay.

In the follow up question asking respondents to share the exact amount that they pay for QCI inspection, 29 respondents left comments. There appears to be significant variation in the payment structure for QCI. At least 10 respondents indicated that they do not contract out QCI work and the QCI inspections are performed by staff members at the state or at local agencies. In other states there is a mix of contracted and on-staff QCI's completing inspections.

Question #5 asked respondents to describe what their contracted QCI fee included. 22 respondents answered this question detailing what services the fee covers. The responses varied widely with some respondents indicating that the fee covered just the inspection, while others included travel, lodging meals, etc. Question #6 asked how many trips were included in the price for QCI inspection. 25 respondents answered this question with the majority (12 respondents) indicating that the fee only included one trip.

#### 2. Tracking

Question #7 asked respondents whether or not they were tracking the number of reworks and/or call backs associated with the QCI process. Of 33 respondents, 14 are tracking callbacks and reworks (42%) while 19 are not (57%). Question 8 asked respondents to share quantitative data on call backs and

reworks as a follow up. Very few responses were received for this question (less than 10) and it appears this is an area where concrete data is lacking. Some respondents shared anecdotal feedback regarding their impression of the impact of the QCI requirements on reworks.

#### 3. Employee Issues

Question #9 asked what percentage of the state's subgrantees had a QCI certified employee. About 66% of respondents indicated that between 80% and 100% of their subgrantees had a certified QCI on staff. Comments provided further data; several respondents indicated that the subgrantees in their state were required to have a QCI certified staff member. The comments also provided more information on contracting of QCI work.

For <u>Question #10</u>, respondents were split relatively evenly on whether or not they had trouble finding qualified employees to take the QCI certification. Just over 48% indicated that they did have issues finding employees while 51% said they did not have issues. Comments revealed strategies used by grantees to overcome these issues including "sharing" QCI certified employees. A few comments indicated that experienced staff had a difficult time getting certified. <u>Question #11</u> revealed a wide range of steps taken by grantees when QCIs do not meet standards. These steps include additional training, revocation of certifications, and other sanctions.

In <u>Question #12</u> respondents overwhelmingly indicated that they had policies regarding the use of T &TA money to pay for QCI training and testing (77%). Comments indicate that T&TA money is generally allocated in the state plan to be available for QCI needs. Respondents were split evenly in <u>Question #13</u> on whether or not they were using QCI requirements on projects that do not use DOE funds. 52% of respondent said that they were, while 47% said they were not.


There were 29 Reponses to <u>Question #14</u> which asked about hourly rates of QCI workers. The lowest figure submitted in the comments was \$12 per hour while the highest figure was \$32.70 per hour. In <u>Question #15</u>, 69% of respondents said that they do not raise salaries for workers that receive the QCI certification. Comments however indicate that salaries are ultimately determined at the local agency level and some subgrantees do raise salaries. Similarly, in <u>Question #16</u> 78% of respondents indicated that their state does not provide any incentives to receive the QCI certification. Comments indicate that the potential for a salary increase is one of the only incentives for the certification

#### 4. General Feedback

The final questions of the survey were open ended and allowed respondents to give maximum input. In **Question #17** respondents shared best practices such as standardized forms, cloud based systems, and checklists. **Question #18** surveyed respondents about the need for additional QCI training. The comments indicated a desire for some in class training to be substituted by web based classes and/or time in the field. **Question #19** asked for any final comments and allowed respondents to be candid in their feedback on the QCI implementation and protocols. There are a wide range of opinions expressed here.



9	Our state was able to train and certify ourselves and our subgrantees via a contract with CHP. We did have an issue with a subgrantee not doing a thorough QCI. they had high turnover so that their QCI inspector had to start overseeing their crews. He was still doing QCI's and we soon realized this and let them no that was not allowable. He have since put out very clear guidance and required a signature of acceptance of QCI terms from each agency and their QCI inspectors, Production or Crew Supervisors and the Weatherization Director. We hope this will clear up any mis information. Related, we are finding that the subgrantees that pay poorly and have poor morale (many times related) have high turnover which leads to problems that are more expensive to address than it would be to pay and treat people appropriately to start. We have started compiling wage info for each position and comparing agencies and sending out that data to them urging them to pay a fair wage. It would be great if NASCSP could do that nationwide, as well as costs to Wx homes, ex. what is the cost per sf. to open blow an R50 attic for each state?
