## COVID-19 Update

OCS will issue guidance by the end of this week.

Most state offices are working from home or have limited staff in the office.

Most agencies are limiting services to essential services only, engaged in telework, or are closed to the public.

Relief package is very close to final and supplemental CSBG funds will be coming.

# COVID-19: State Flexibilities

- <u>Eligibility</u>: While states cannot waive the 125% of FPL requirement, states may revise eligibility documentation requirements or calculation methodologies
  - Example: State is now allowing self-attestation of meeting income requirements. May or may not include follow up at a later time.
  - Example: State is allowing for presumptive eligibility based on job loss or other unemployment due to COVID-19.
  - Example: State has reduced income verification documentation from 6 months to 1 month.



# COVID-19: State Flexibilities

- Board Vacancies: States may need to allow for longer board vacancies due to virus impacts. Refer to your state policy for extenuating circumstances/extensions.
- Agency Administrative Caps: Although the federal GPRA target for administrative costs is 20%, CSBG does not have a set administrative cap at the federal level. States may determine that administrative caps need to be raised to allow agencies to cover PTO, costs associated with maintaining clean and safe facilities, and other virus-related administrative costs.



# COVID-19: State Flexibilities

- <u>Contract Requirements:</u> Unless within state or federal law, States can amend contract requirements to allow for needed flexibility:
  - Required prior authorization to amend budgets/plans
  - Open Meetings Requirements
  - Administrative Caps



## COVID-19: | State Flexibilities

- <u>Organizational Standards:</u> States have authority to determine what "meets" an organizational standard.
- <u>Community Needs Assessments:</u> Criteria for what constitutes a comprehensive community needs assessment vary by state-the state has authority to revise requirements (outside of those required in Org Standards) as appropriate



## COVID-19: State Flexibilities

 <u>Discretionary Funding:</u> As agencies are requesting additional funds to address the crisis and it's impacts, states are redirecting discretionary dollars to support local response.

## Legislative Update



The President has signed HR 6201, the Families First Coronavirus Response Act (FFCRA). It includes:

- An extensive paid leave component that is two fold: new emergency sick leave, as well as an expansion of the existing Paid Family and Medical Leave Act (FMLA).
- Free coronavirus testing and other healthcare supports for those with and without insurance.
- Additional funding for WIC, TEFAP and Senior Nutrition Programs.

## Legislative Update



- A third coronavirus relief package is very close to being final.
- We are seeing additional funding for CSBG along with direct payments to Americans, small business loans, deferred payments and additional mortgage or rent supports, and more.
- CSBG is identified as receiving \$1 billion dollars from this package.
- This is the exact same amount as received in ARRA, but this time there is state admin and discretionary.

## Supplemental Considerations

 While the supplemental raises the income guidelines from 125% to 200% FPL, this only applies to supplemental funds and not regular CSBG Allocations.

- The bill allows for CSBG to be spent over two years (FY20 and FY21).
- In supplementals, all regular rules of the grant apply unless otherwise specified by Congress in the Bill.
  - This means states will likely need to develop state plans in OLDC to receive Supplemental Funding.
  - States will also need to be prepared to carry out all normal functions of CSBG, including monitoring and reporting of these funds.
- Begin planning now!
  - Legislature approval
  - Contracts
  - Invoicing
  - Policy and Guidance

### Statement From NASCSP on Coronavirus (COVID-19)

We understand that State CSBG and WAP Offices may be concerned with preparing for the coronavirus: as employers, service providers, and community leaders. NASCSP is supporting state CSBG and WAP offices as they work to respond to the emerging needs of their state networks and follow state level directives coming out of governors' offices and state departments of health. ## NASCSP COVID 19 FAQ

#### COVID-19 FAQ for CSBG

NASCSP is aware of the unique challenges posed by the COVID-19 pandemic and is here to support your state and networks as you respond. NASCSP is working with OCS and the National Partners to develop tools, resources, guidance, and support for you. This document is one tool you can use to find answers to commonly asked questions about CSBG in relation to COVID-19. This document will be updated regularly as additional guidance and information become available.

#### Can the CSBG eligibility requirements be adjusted?

The 125% of the Federal Poverty Level is a statutory requirement and therefore cannot be waived by state offices. However, states may revise eligibility documentation requirements or calculation methodologies. See CAPLAW's <u>publication on client eligibility</u> for additional considerations. <u>CSBG IM #154</u> also provides guidance to states on revising eligibility criteria in times of crisis or disaster.

#### Will CSBG receive additional federal allocations to respond to COVID-19?

There is potential that CSBG may receive supplemental funding. While specific details and timelines are not yet available, typically supplemental funds are allocated by Congress with a clear intended purpose, and then the funds would be able to be used just like normal CSBG for that purpose. Typically, supplementals follow all normal funding rules unless Congress specifies otherwise. We will keep you posted as this unfolds.
