- The purpose of WIOA is to better align the workforce system with education and economic development in an effort to create a collective response to economic and labor market challenges on the national, state, and local levels.
 - Prosperity of U.S. Economy
 - Improve ROI on Workforce Investment
 - Access and Opportunity
 - Support Alignment of Workforce System
 - Promote Improved Service Delivery
- Builds off of WIA to continue to govern Workforce Development Boards (WDB), or Workforce Investment Boards (WIB)
- Boards run the local "One Stop" or American Job Center





Local Board Functions

- Develop and submit plan (or regional plan), in partnership with LEO, to governor
- · Workforce research and regional labor market analysis
- Convene, broker, leverage
- Employer engagement
- Career pathways development
- Promote proven and promising practices
- Cutting-edge use of technology
- Program oversight
- Negotiation of local performance accountability measures
- Selection of operators and providers
- Coordination with education providers
- Budget and administration
- Accessibility for people with disabilities

- 5% people with disabilities



WIOA Stats

Percentage Served through WIOA by Education Level at Entry

- No High School Degree or Equivalent: 9.6%
- High School Degree or Equivalent: 42%
- Post-Secondary Technical or Vocational Certification: 3.6%
- One or more Year of College: 17.3%
- Associates Degree: 8.7%
- Bachelor's Degree: 13.4%
- Degree Beyond Bachelors: 5%
