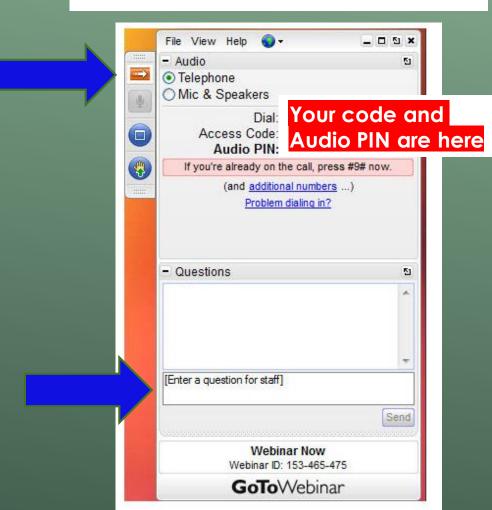

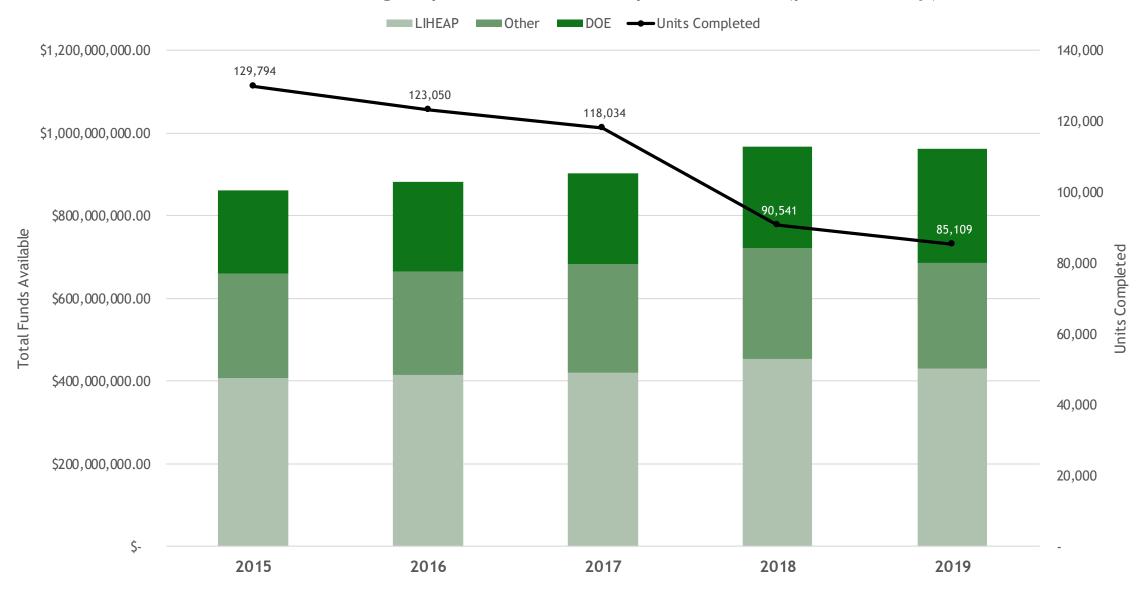

4.1 MULTI-YEAR GRANT AWARDS

"The existing grant awards were scheduled for completion at the end of PY 2020. These awards will be extended for one additional year. This results in a four five-year grant cycle with a project period end date scheduled in 2021."

- ▶ Due to the ongoing pandemic, final version of Application Instructions will include option to combine 2020-2021 or 2019-20-21 budget periods ONLY IF relief is needed for ACPU due to COVID-19 production delays
- ► Expect to see final version before the end of the year (waiting for CR)

Legislative updates

FY 2021 Regular Appropriations

- ► House passed appropriations on 7/31, Senate just introduced
- ▶ Both included our requested appropriation of \$310 million for WAP.
- ► House included supplemental language for ACPU fix, Admin %, and \$3 billion WAP stimulus
 - ► This is not being negotiated on as focus is "clean" appropriations

WAP Reauthorization Bill Status

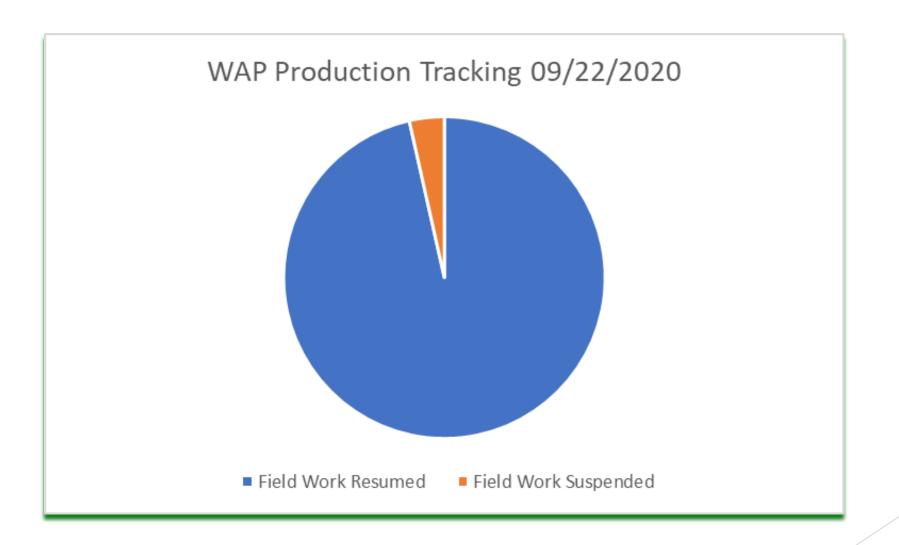
- ► Senate energy bill S 2657 may be passed during Lame Duck
 - ► Includes up to \$350 annually for WAP through 2024, Admin %, T&TA going to contractors

Legislative Updates

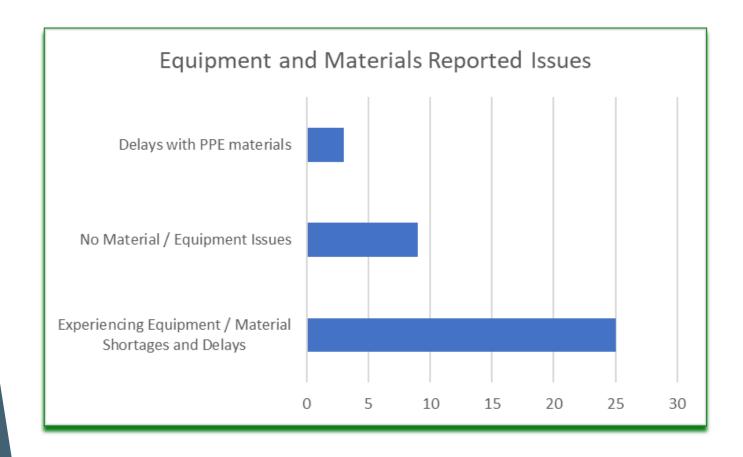
- ► NASCSP keeping the Hill updated on the current status of the WAP network
 - ► Also recommended short term fixes e.g. authority for Secretary to waive the ACPU

- ► LIHEAP stimulus may be an element of a COVID relief package
 - ► Could be passed during Lame Duck or early 2021

NASCSP Poll of Grantees - 10/31/2020



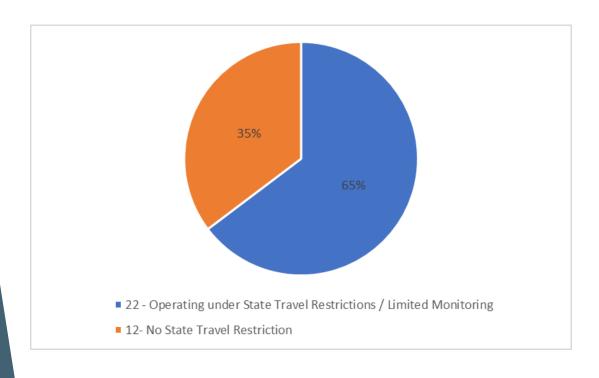
Grantees reported

- 11 of 35 Grantee respondents plan on using remote or virtual monitoring.
- 4 Grantees are working on developing remote monitoring for State QA
- Requires DOE approval

Member Planning and Action Summary: Workforce

Q: How can we quantify the cost of turn-over in WAP? What factors need to be considered?

- 1. Recruitment and training costs are higher than retention costs
- 2. Working with agencies to understand the cost of turn-over and how to prevent
- 3. Education needed on the skill of the position and certifications required
- 4. Underpaying WAP workers, need better branding and salary scales to attract people
- 5. State is working with local agency to define cost of turn-over in their state

Member Planning and Action Summary: Workforce

Q: Have you met with your Subgrantees to determine the leading cause(s) of turnover or inability to recruit new employees in the WAP?

- 1. Wages
- 2. Work environment and culture
- 3. Wage gap between WAP and other similar jobs like utility, oil/gas and construction industry
- 4. Inability to recruit new staff, no clear career path and no pay scales with WAP.
- 5. Finding people with experience to sit for QCI certifications
- 6. Recruiting contractors into the program when competition from other industry is high

Member Planning and Action Summary: Workforce

Q: Would your state want to conduct a WAP wage survey on the Subgrantees? Which option would your state prefer to use?

- 1. Preference for Option 1
- 2. Agencies are more likely to complete Option 2
- 3. Our State already captures this wage data in required CAA budgets
- 4. Suggest that race and gender be captured to ensure equity
- 5. Urban vs. rural considerations must be factored if collecting a range
- 6. Information is needed to assess wages and bring them up if need to the changes in program
- 7. Not currently, our CAAs have a lot on their plate right now

Workforce Development Working Group (WDWG) Updates

- Wage survey templates
 - Finalizing Option 1 and Option 2
 - States can choose which, if any, survey template to use
 - Testing in November; Release survey templates by January 2021
- Cost of Turnover in the WAP
 - Two WDWG members are working with local agencies on defining
 - Illinois and Vermont presenting at the CAP MLTC in February
- Upcoming Workforce Webinar
 - Presentations by WDWG on existing wage surveys and cost of turn-over
 - Instructions and overview of Option 1 and Option 2 survey templates

- Department of Labor Prevailing Wage Lookup
 - Select State, Select County
 - Enter "Weatherization" under "Enter Keyword or Phrase". Hit Search.
 - First result will be "47-4099.03 Weatherization Installers and Technicians
 - Select: "View Wages for OES/SOC 47-4099: Construction and Related Workers, All Other"
 - Will display wage level 1-4 and mean wage. Data is current as of July 2019.
