Community Services Block Grant CARES Supplemental Annual Report

THE PAPERWORK REDUCTION ACT OF 1995 (Pub. L. 104-13): Public reporting burden for this collection of information is estimated to average 107 hours per grantee and 493 per sub-grantee per response, including the time for reviewing instructions, gathering and maintaining the data needed, and reviewing the collection of information. An agency may not conduct or sponsor, and a person is not required to respond to, a collection of information unless it disabases a currently walf of DMR control number:

 - CSBG Supplemental Annual Reports include modified versions of Modules 1, 2, and 4.
 - Respondents only submit Module 3 once through the regular CSBG Annual Report.
- OCS did make a point to want to reduce reporting burden

Supplemental Reporting: What We Know Proposed

Modules 1-3

- Module 1 will be simplified and focus on CSBG CARES & Disaster:
 - Includes allocations to eligible entities
 - State usage of CARES & Disaster funds
 - Report out on CARES State Plan
 - Lessons learned
- Some information will not be required in CARES & Disaster. Example: Module
 2 Section B removed for CARES and Disaster
- Module 3 will be reported in the same way. The only change is that it will have a dropdown for choosing the funding source (CSBG, CARES, Disaster).

Module 4

- Not many changes; M4
 is focused on outcomes,
 services, and people
 - One of the main changes is in reporting the NPIs. For example, columns 2-5 with targeting has been removed to focus on individuals served
 - Many sections are greyed out to keep the general structure the same to adapt these forms within the existing data systems and structures

- -Module 4 would require reporting on people, services, and outcomes that were funded by CSBG CARES

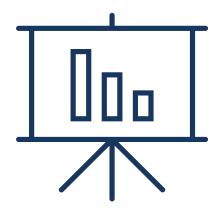
Due: May 30, 2021

- -Module 4 would require reporting on people, services, and outcomes that were funded by CSBG Disaster funds

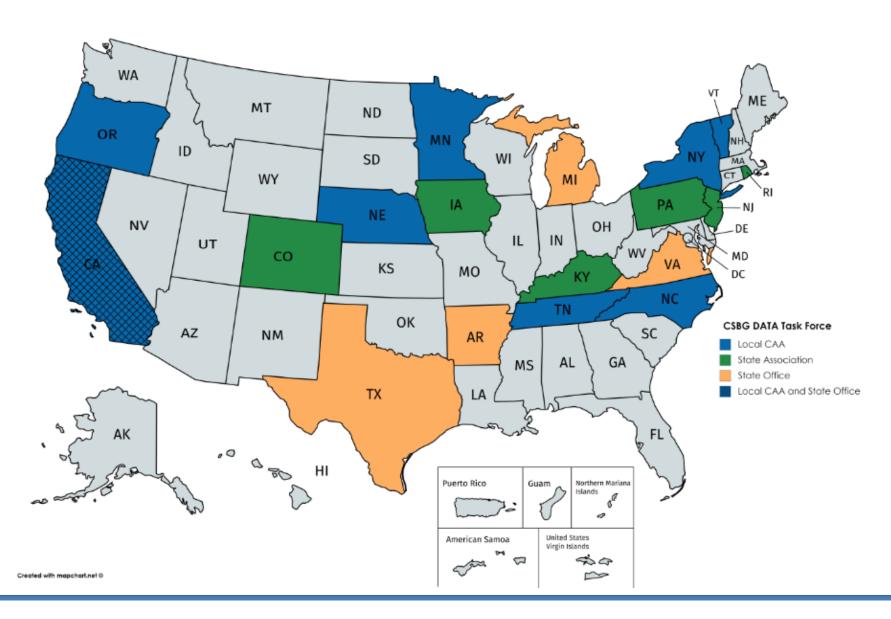
Data Submission – Supplemental Reports - Proposed

- Due to time constraints, OCS is considering asking all eligible entities to use "SmartForms" to submit the first CSBG CARES and CSBG Disaster Supplemental reports
- DATA Task Force recommends that CARES and Disaster reports be submitted through normal submission processes
 - States would receive SmartForms for supplemental reporting
 - States with data systems could use their regular system

What is the CSBG DATA Task Force?

The CSBG DATA Task Force is convened by the National Association for State Community Services Programs (NASCSP) to assist the Office of Community Services (OCS) and NASCSP in understanding and addressing the CSBG Network's data needs and the use of data for analysis and continual improvement of results. DATA Task Force

- The DATA Task Force convened in December & January to respond to OCS's proposed strategy for supplemental reporting
- OCS requested feedback in the following areas:
 - 1) Eligible Entity Data
 Capacity and Analysis
 - 2) State Data Systems,
 Oversight and Analysis
 - 3) Telling the CSBG
 Supplemental Story
 - 4) Other Concerns and Recommendations



DATA Task Force - Recommendations

- Incorporate CARES and Disaster reporting into the regular submission of the CSBG Annual Report rather than reporting separately
 - This will prevent extra burden and maintain integrity and accuracy of data
 - Separate reporting is not feasible for all entities
 - Reporting solely on the people, services, and outcomes supported by CARES or Disaster funding would not show a clear picture of impact
- Use previous CSBG Annual Reports to compare the reports and show impact of CSBG CARES and Disaster investments



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DATA Task Force - Recommendations

- Module 2 Adaptation to the regular CSBG Annual Report:
- Add an expenditure chart for each supplemental fund to Section A.
- Keep Section B.
- Add a CARES and Disaster data point to Section C, C.2 "Amount of FYX CSBG allocated to reporting entity".
- Add a CARES column to Section C, C.3 "Federal Resources Allocated".
- Expand Section A, A.4.1 and identify this as a place where agencies can provide a narrative on how they used CSBG to alter their offices for touchless services, purchase of PPE, remote workstations, etc.

DATA Task Force - Recommendations

- Module 4 Adaptation to the Regular CSBG Annual Report:
- Add the following services to Section C: Cash Assistance, PPE, and ten rows for "Other Services" to be written in by the local agency in order to provide flexibility in reporting services that are specific to COVID related issues.
- Add a service count section to Section C for the following services: boxes of food, pounds of food, hygiene kits, referrals and amount of housing (rent or mortgage) payments.

NASCSP Comments to OMB

- Collecting information on CARES and Disaster impact is necessary, but it is not necessary that it be collected through separate reports
 - Separate reports would create great administrative burden and risk data inaccuracies
- Reporting on a single funding stream does not make sense for CSBG because CSBG is not a program. It is a strategy that supports, coordinates, and leverages all work of the entity.

In partnership with our state members and other CSBG National Partners, we have reviewed, considered, and discussed the changes to the CSBG Annual Report to identify opportunities for

NASCSP Comments to OMB

- Module 2, Section B
 - The Supplemental Reports do not ask for data on Eligible Entity Capacity
 - This section has critical information such as volunteer hours and partners that are important in telling the story of CARES
- Module 4, Section A
 - The Supplemental Reports do not ask for the outcomes in the FNPIs to be reported
 - Outcomes achieved by individuals and families represent critical information that OCS needs to inform Congress on how community action programs are outcome focused and achieve results

NASCSP is concerned about the use of proportional analysis in Module 4.

NASCSP Comments to OMB

 NASCSP believes the estimated hours of administrative burden posed by OCS is accurate but unnecessarily burdensome during the COVID-19 crisis



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Data Submission – Regular Report

- FY 19 data is nearly finalized
- States will start to receive SmartForms to collect FY 20 data for the Annual Report in mid-February
 - States will receive the SmartForms in February/March 2020
 - States who have statewide databases can use an XML for a direct transfer to OLDC
 - Module 1 will continue to be submitted through OLDC
- These SmartForms will look similar to previous year's forms
 - There are additional questions in Module 3 to report funding source
- Due April 30th

Presidential Executive Order: Expanding Educational Opportunity Through School Choice

- OCS released <u>DCL-2021-07 Use of Funds Expanding Educational</u>
 <u>Opportunities</u> which provides guidance on the President's Executive
 Order <u>Expanding Educational Opportunity through School Choice</u>.
 - The DCL reminds states and local entities that the CSBG Act establishes
 the authority for grantees to use their CSBG allocations to support
 emergency learning scholarships and supports as outlined in the
 Executive Order if these needs are identified in an eligible entity's local
 community needs assessment.
- This order does not supersede the requirement from the CSBG Act that states allocate 90% of their CSBG award to local CSBG eligible entities. CSBG eligible entities are required to use their 90% funds to respond to the unique needs of its community identified in its needs assessment. Federal and state governments do not have the authority to direct how 90% of funds will be used by local CSBG eligible entities. Thus, this order does not (and cannot) mandate that agencies or states use CSBG funds this way.

Presidential Executive Order: What Can States Do?

- The CSBG Act includes provisions that authorize states to allow such expenditures. These are allowable as long as the need has been identified in the needs assessment.
- Develop standard messaging for constituent and other inquiries.

 Encourage constituents who are low income and in need of financial assistance or other support to contact their local CSBG eligible entity or Community Action Agency for help. CSBG eligible entities may have other programs that the constituent can benefit from.
- Brief your leadership. Make sure leadership is aware of the order, its implications, and department actions to respond to inquiries.
- <u>If necessary, consult your legal counsel.</u> Depending on your state, verifying your plan of action and messaging with legal counsel may be appropriate.
- <u>Support your agencies.</u> Ensure your agencies are aware of the order and are prepared to respond to inquiries from constituents and others.

Organizational Standards



- CSBG Working Group (convened by NCAP) is working to identify Organizational Standards that may need exemptions or flexibilities in response to the Pandemic.
 - Working group is made up of all levels of the network including agencies, states, associations, and national partners.

States have the authority to interpret what "meets" an Organizational Standard.
