Federal Coordination on Eligibility

- Since February 2020, DOE has collaborated with HHS and HUD on how to better support interagency coordination on client eligibility for the respective programs.
 - WAP
 - LIHEAP
 - HUD Home Repair programs (Lead Hazard Control, Healthy Housing, Housing Rehabilitation)

Client Eligibility





Households using up to **200**% of Federal Poverty Guidelines (FPG).

Households using 150% of FPG or states may elect to use 60% of State Median Income (SMI), whichever is greater for their respective state.

Each Grantee is permitted under **42 USC 8624(b)(2)(B)** to set an income limit within this range.

WEATHERIZATION PROGRAM NOTICE 21-3 EFFECTIVE DATE: February 10, 2021

SUBJECT: 2021 FEDERAL POVERTY GUIDELINES AND DEFINITION OF INCOME

INTENDED AUDIENCE: WAP Grantee Program Managers, WAP Subgrantee Managers

PURPOSE: To provide Grantees with the 2021 Federal Poverty Guidelines and Definition of Income for use in the Low-Income Weatherization Assistance Program (WAP).

SUPERSEDES: Weatherization Program Notice (WPN) 21-3 supersedes WPN 20-3.

SCOPE: The provisions of this WPN apply to all WAP Grantees applying for financial assistance under the Department of Energy's (DOE) WAP. This Notice supersedes WPN 20-3.

LEGAL AUTHORITY: Title IV, Energy Conservation and Production Act, as amended, authorizes DOE to administer the WAP. All grant awards made under this Program shall comply with all applicable laws and regulations including, but not limited to, the WAP Regulations contained in Code of Federal Regulations (CFR) 10 CFR Part 440, as applicable.

PROCEDURES: The annual revision of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) poverty income guidelines is published in the Federal Register. The guidelines are accessible at the HHS website, as well.

Attached is a table displaying the revised guidelines showing income eligibility limits at 200 percent of the poverty guidelines per the requirements contained in Section 412(7) of the Energy Conservation and Production Act (42 U.S.C. 6862(7)). Adjusted tables for Alaska and Hawaii are also included. These guidelines are effective as of January 13, 2021, and apply to both farm and non-farm families. American Samoa, Guam, Northern Arapaho, Northern Marianas, Puerto Rico and US Virgin Islands must select the appropriate set of poverty guidelines and include them in their State Plans for review and approval by DOE prior to use.

Grantees shall distribute these tables immediately to their Subgrantees for use in the Program from the effective date of this Guidance until updated in subsequent policy documents. Additionally, this WPN provides Grantees with a definition of income for use in the WAP. This Guidance continues to reaffirm previous guidance by outlining what is expected to be available in terms of source documentation for review when requested by an outside authority.

- Released annually with Application Package.
- Provides specifics on income eligibility limits and other pertinent details.

Client Eligibility – Income Thresholds

Income eligibility must be in accordance with DOE regulations. The family must be:

- At or below 200% of the poverty level, relevant to size of the family.
- Eligible for supplemental cash assistance payments under Title IV or Title XVI of the Social Security Act, or
- If the Grantee elects, eligible for LIHEAP, provided LIHEAP eligibility is at or below 200% of poverty.


Client Eligibility - Income Determination

Income means **Cash Receipts** earned and/or received by the applicant before taxes during the applicable tax year(s).



Money, wages and salaries





Pensions, including military retirement pay, insurance or annuity payments



Net rental income and net royalties



Social Security payments



Net gambling or lottery winnings

Client Eligibility – Income Exclusions

The following **Cash Receipts** are <u>not</u> considered sources of income when determining applicant eligibility:





of real estate or cars



Assets drawn down



College scholarships

Insurance payments or injury compensation

Federal non-cash benefits (Medicare, Medicaid, Food Stamps, etc.)



For families with more than 8 persons, add \$4,540 for each additional person. Therefore, for weatherization at 200% of poverty level, add \$9,080 for each additional person.





LIHEAP Transfer Rules – Mostly LIHEAP

- When a Grantee indicates a rule exception in their LIHEAP plan, it generally means they are following the DOE rules for that issue.
 - Income threshold = 200% FPL
 - Multifamily eligibility = at least 66% of units must incomequalify)
 - Weatherization of temporary shelters
- Four Grantees specified an allowable average cost per unit (ACPU) that is greater than the current DOE ACPU.

LIHEAP Transfer Rules – Mostly DOE

According to 2021 LIHEAP Plans, common exceptions:

- Average cost per unit (19 Grantees)
- Savings to investment ratio (18 Grantees)
- Reweatherization date (13 Grantees)
- Energy related repairs (6 Grantees)
 - Possible measures: minor structural repairs, mold/moisture control, electrical repairs
 - Unallowable practices: roof replacement, major construction
 - Important to base your program design on data (<u>deferral</u> tracking) and set cost or other limits on repairs.

LIHEAP Transfer Rules – Mostly DOE


Other DOE rule exceptions:

- No Health and Safety limit or higher H&S limit (8)
- No QCI required (3)
- No SIR or SIR < 1.0 (3)
- Cook stove replacement allowed (3)
- No ASHRAE required

Training

If following Mostly DOE, use LIHEAP funds for training is allowed.

Braided WAP/LIHEAP Funds In a House Can Pay For...


- Whole-House Energy Audit
- Measures installed to Standard Work Specifications(SWS)
- Final Inspection/Quality Control Inspection(QCI)
- Administrative Costs
- Training

LIHEAP Funds ONLY In a House Can Pay For...

- Health & Safety measures not allowed in Weatherization Program Notice 17-7, such as cookstove replacements.
- Scopes of work that do not meet DOE guidelines, for example, Weatherization without meeting ASHRAE ventilation standards.

Braiding Funds and ACPU

Braiding DOE Funds



- 18 Grantees reported No Braiding
- 9 of those Grantees exceeded the DOE ACPU as of February 2021

Considerations for Braiding DOE & LIHEAP

- Develop a strategy for measure costing
 - Provide guidance to Subgrantees (e.g., funding matrix)
- Maximize DOE funds used in each home, staying within allowable average funds statewide
- Cost Containment Set limits for jobs, measures and/or fund types (e.g., repairs, H&S, support)
- Coordinate Outreach Prioritize applications for weatherization
 - Identify key indicators
 - Provide T&TA to LIHEAP staff
 - Co-branding
