SUBJECT: PROGRAM YEAR 2023 WEATHERIZATION GRANT APPLICATION

INTENDED AUDIENCE: Weatherization Grantee Managers, Weatherization Subgrantee Managers

INTENDED USE: The Department of Energy (DOE) issues Weatherization Program Notices (WPN) to establish the framework to administer appropriated funds to the Weatherization Assistance Program (WAP). The content of this document, as well as the two attachments, provides programmatic information to WAP Managers to develop a WAP Grantee Plan to ensure that funds are dispersed to weatherization providers in a timely manner.

DOE issues the application package annually to specifically address changes from one Program Year (PY) to the next. These changes are often precipitated by Congressional inquiries, administrative priorities, including new initiatives from other federal agencies, monitoring in the field, and feedback from the network of stakeholders. The annual document, issued as a WPN, serves to highlight and remind Grantees of these issues, and provide resources so they may include the information as appropriate to their specific circumstances in applying for WAP formula funds.

The WPN attachments serve as programmatic, financial, and legal resources with clarifying information on areas of the Application Instructions that must be incorporated into the submitted Grantee Plan. The Grantee Plan and other elements of WAP Grant Application Package are submitted through WAP's reporting system, Performance and Accountability for Grants in Energy (PAGE).



Reason for carryover amount: The \$20,000 state database upgrade budgeted under Grantee Administration was delayed for several months and will be completed in the next PY. Subgrantee Administration results from a local agency manager leaving. All T&TA goals were met with fewer resources than budgeted. Production at two local agencies was affected by job changes, thus leaving \$35,000 unspent in Program Operations and \$10,000 in Health & Safety (H&S).

Justification for carryover amount: The Grantee requests \$20,000 in Grantee Administration to complete database upgrade as previously proposed. \$7,000 returned to Subgrantee Administration to complete the remaining work. \$25,000 in T&TA and \$500 from Financial Audits carryover moved to Program Operations to complete more homes. Based on the Grantee expenditure limit identified in Weatherization Program Notice (WPN) 22-7, the proposed H&S amount was adjusted to reflect the proposed remaining Program Operations funding.



Leveraging Funds Implementation

DOE is aware that reporting may be difficult where multiple sources of funds as a result of leveraging are used to weatherize a unit, or a complicated leveraging agreement has been reached with non-Federal partners. To assist Grantees and Subgrantees in determining what a DOE weatherized unit is, DOE offers the following definition.


A DOE Weatherized unit is: A dwelling on which a DOE-approved energy audit or priority list has been applied and weatherization work has been completed. As funds allow, the measures installed on this unit and paid for with DOE funds have a Savings-to-Investment Ratio (SIR) of 1.0 or greater, but also may include any necessary energy-related health and safety measures.

The use of DOE funds on a unit may include, but is not limited to, indirect expenditures (e.g., Administrative, T&TA, amortized equipment) and direct costs such as energy auditing, measure installation, H&S, and inspections. A dwelling unit that meets both the definition of a DOE weatherized unit and uses **DOE funds for direct costs must be reported as a DOE completed unit.**





SUBJECT: Program Year 2022 Weatherization Assistance Program (WAP) Formula Grants; National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) Determination

This letter serves to notify Grantees that the Contracting Officer and the NEPA Compliance Officer have revised and approved a revision to Attachment 6, NEPA Determination 2022A.

The Allowable Activities of the 2022 NEPA Determination (GFO-WAP-2022A) is revised as follows:

- 6. Readiness activities focused on structural, health, and safety issues required before weatherization measures can be completed, provided that activities adhere to the requirements of the respective Recipients' DOE executed Historic Preservation Programmatic Agreement, are installed in existing buildings, and are limited to:
- a. Repair/replace damaged windows and doors
- b. Electrical and plumbing repairs
- Poofrancis
- d. Roof replacement including, replacing decking material and roof, and/or changing roof material (e.g., shingles to metal) NOTE-These activities would likely require SHPO consultation on buildings 45 years or older, as applicable per each recipient's Historic Preservation Programmatic Agreement (PA). Recipients must review their PA to understand their responsibilities for SHPO consultation.
- e. Interior and exterior wall repairs
- f. Ceiling repairs
- g. Floor repairs
- h. Foundation or subspace (crawl space) repairs
- Exterior drainage repairs limited to gutter repair or replacement, trimming shrubs, and/or grading in close proximity to the perimeter of the foundation.

Note that all other Allowable Activities remain unchanged, and this determination is in addition to Term 7, NEPA Requirements of the Special Terms and Conditions, which still apply. All restrictions, conditions, and requirements listed in the NEPA determinations remain unchanged.



- Any Grantee that desires to administer fuel-switching may submit a request to implement the necessary procedures and policies to their DOE PO. See WPN 19-4
- All DOE WAP Grantees may perform cost-effective fuelswitching installations utilizing Formula funds, E&I, and SERC
- Section V.5



Multi-Year Grant Awards (4.1)

- All Grantees are expected to make an effort to spend out DOE annual formula funds
- Grantees must estimate prior year carryover to include in plan submission
- Grantees must minimize carryover to the fullest extent possible.




Success Strategies for State Plan Development



#1 -Start early


- Update policy and procedure manuals, health and safety plans, monitoring documents, T&TA plans.
- Review the new WPN and Memo releases since the last plan
- Host in-person meeting with WAP Subgrantees for input into plan the quarter before your planning starts
- Set placeholders on your calendar for state planning time

Do all of these **prior** to the core state plan development.



#2 Talk to your DOE Project Officer

- When WPNs come out, use your monthly calls to discuss what your project officer expects to see in the state plan
- Talk through any assumptions that could affect your entire plan
- Get things in WRITING best practice
- Ask for early review of parts of the plan
- When in doubt, reach out
