



Why should we care about CARES



 CSBG CARES is an Opportunity to Demonstrate our Value

 Family, Agency, Community Needs Still Exist

Reauthorization







- Began looking at CARES expenditures in Oct 2021
 - National Average 43%
 - Illinois 50%
 - Requested agencies below 50% to submit a spending plan
- Second expenditure analysis conducted in Jan 2022
 - National Average 62%
 - Illinois 60%
 - Conducted one-on-one meetings with agencies below 65%







- Conducted survey of all agencies April to determine what plans they had in place to spend funds
 - Waiting on modification execution
 - Rental Assistance programs
 - Food and hygiene products for pantries
- Expenditure analysis conducted May 2022
 - National Average 74%
 - Illinois 66%
 - Open discussion at Annual Workshop







- In Person to maximize participation
- Recognized all grantees that had spent 90% of grant funds or more
 - They appreciated their work being recognized
 - Asked them to share what practices they felt were most helpful in expending the funds
- Strategically broke grantees up into pre-assigned groups with each group having
 - An equal number of agencies that spent over 90%
 - An equal number of agencies over the State average
 - An equal number of agencies below the State average







- What can the State do to assist you in spending?
- For CAAs with lower spend rates, have you reached out to your peers for ideas?
- For CAAs with higher spend rates, what programs did you offer that were successful in providing meaningful outcomes with a higher cost of service?
- What programs do you currently have in place that you could rapidly increase funding?
- At what point would you be willing to provide additional funding to a food pantry/bank to expend your remaining balances?

- Utilize case notes to show link to COVID
 - Link does not necessarily need to be recent
 - Many COVID issues have a lingering effect that can cause undo strain for an extended period
- Consider relaxing sustainability measures or extending availability of assistance
 - Waive financial literacy classes
 - Offer multiple months of benefits
 - Increase dollar limits available
- Market CARES resources through schools, daycares, landlords, local politicians, etc.
- Coordinate with LIHWAP and LIHEAP to assist in paying additional client assistance for those with remaining balances
- Bundle services to CARES recipients
