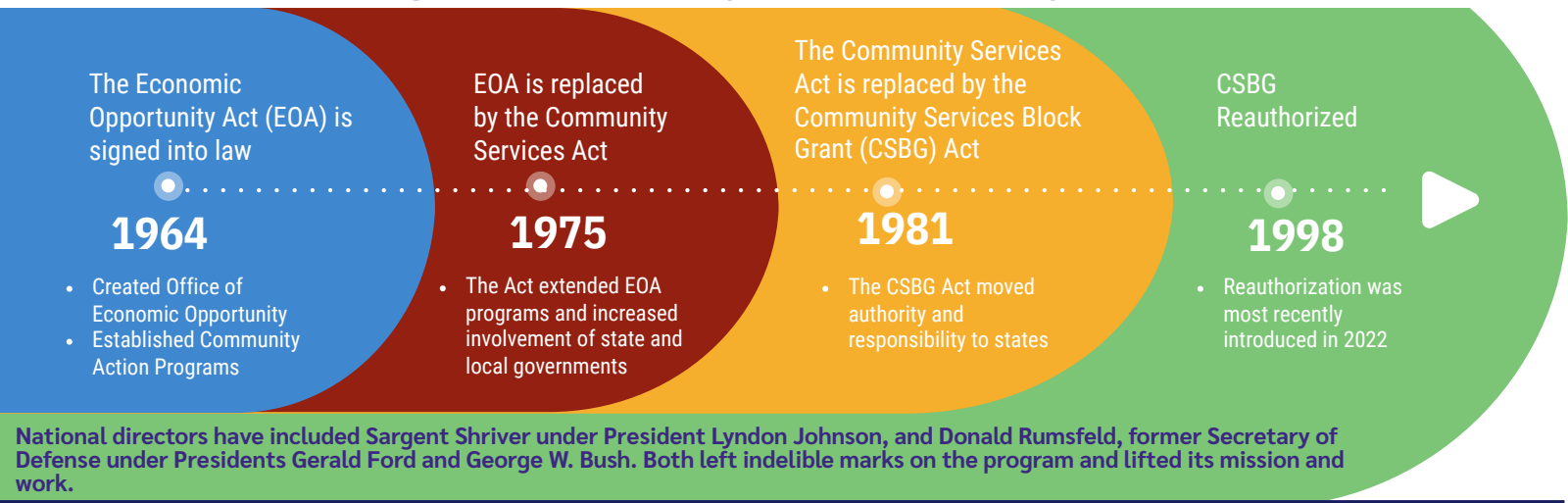

Legislative History of Community Action



CSBG State Offices

State Offices **convene, connect, collaborate,** and **communicate** to leverage resources, enhance information-sharing, and develop innovative tools, resulting in strong local networks and reduced poverty across each state and the country.

Fifty-three State and Territory Offices support approximately 1,000 Community Action Agencies across rural, suburban and urban communities nationwide. By **stewarding funds,** providing robust **training and technical assistance, ensuring compliance** with all applicable regulations, performing **data collection** required for annual **congressional reports,** and more; State Offices enable steady funding to flow from the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) to Community Action Agencies (CAAs) and build pipelines out of poverty.

841,350 children, youth and adults were supported in education and cognitive development.
