WHO WE SERVED...



For FFY 2019:

There were 19 CAAs, serving 73,997 people with low incomes who were living in 42,472 families.

CAAs served 15,267 people who lacked healthcare, 9,265 people who reported having a disability, 10,233 senior citizens, 28,497 children living in poverty, and 2,571 veterans and active military persons.



WHAT IS CSBG?

The Community Services Block Grant (CSBG) provides critical funding to Community Action Agencies (CAAs) to operate programs addressing the causes and conditions of poverty under three national goals:

Oklahoma's Community Action Agencies are centrally located to serve their communities. For maximum impact, they partnered with:

- 582 non-profits
- 348 for-profits
- 231 faith-based organizations
- 304 school districts



There were 426,483 hours of volunteer time donated to CAAs in Oklahoma.

Community Action Agencies utilize a Results Oriented Management and Accountability system that is strategically designed to ensure accountability and

improve performance management. In FY19, there were 6 ROMA professionals available in the network to help agencies with planning, reporting, data analysis and evaluation.

Community Action Agencies leverage several other federal, state, local, and other private funds.

For every \$1 of CSBG, Oklahoma's CAAs leveraged \$31.51 from federal, state, local, and private sources, including the value of volunteer hours.

- \$7,522,288 in CSBG funds were allocated in support of CAAs in Oklahoma in FY19.
- Including all leveraged funds, Oklahoma had \$241,482,174 available to the CAA network to improve the lives of people with low incomes in FY19.

Community Action Agencies utilize CSBG funds to address specific local needs through services and programs that address one or more of the core domains in which we work: employment, education and cognitive development, income, infrastructure and asset building, housing, health and social behavioral development, and civic engagement and community involvement.

EMPLOYMENT

876 outcomes were obtained in the employment domain. This includes outcomes such as obtaining and maintaining a job, increasing income, and obtaining benefits.

EDUCATION

50,638 outcomes were obtained in the education and cognitive development domain. This includes outcomes such as improved literacy skills, school readiness, and obtaining additional education and diplomas.

INCOME & ASSETS

5,714 outcomes were obtained in the income and asset building domain. This includes outcomes such as maintaining a budget, opening a savings account, increasing assets and net worth, and improving financial well-being.



CIVIC ENGAGEMENT

1,254 outcomes were obtained in the civic engagement and community involvement domain. This includes outcomes such as increasing leadership skills, and improving social networks.

HOUSING

7,645 outcomes were obtained in the housing domain. This includes outcomes such as obtaining and maintaining housing, avoiding eviction or foreclosure, and reducing energy burden.

HEALTH

62,213 outcomes were obtained in the health and social/behavioral development domain. This includes outcomes such as increasing nutrition skills, improving physical or mental health, and living independently.
