WHO WE SERVED...



For FFY 2020:

There were 15 CAAs, serving 1,207 people with low incomes who were living in 250 families.

CAAs served 513 people who lacked healthcare, 4 senior citizens, 758 children living in poverty, and 1 veteran and active military person.

WHAT IS CSBG?

The Community Services Block Grant (CSBG) provides critical funding to Community Action Agencies (CAAs) to operate programs addressing the causes and conditions of poverty under three national goals:

Goal 1 - Individuals and families with low incomes are stable and achieve economic security.

Goal 2 - Communities where people with low incomes live are healthy and offer economic opportunity.

Goal 3 - People with low incomes are engaged and active in building opportunities in communities.

American Samoa's Community Action Agencies are centrally located to serve their communities. For maximum impact, they partnered with:

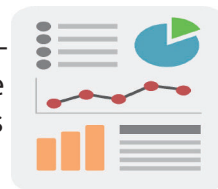
- 13 non-profits
- 14 for-profits
- 30 faith-based organizations
- 8 school districts



There were 7,070 hours of volunteer time donated to CAAs in American Samoa.

What kind of RESOURCES do CAAs have?

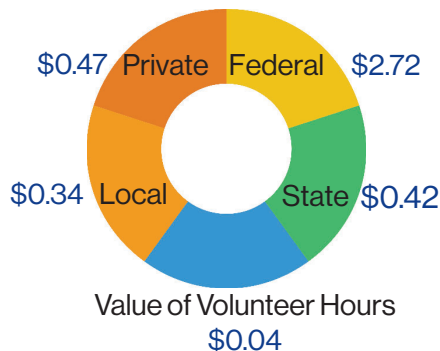
Community Action Agencies utilize a Results Oriented Management and Accountability system that is strategically designed to ensure accountability and improve performance management. ROMA professionals available in the network to help agencies with planning, reporting, data analysis and evaluation.



Community Action Agencies leverage several other federal, state, local, and other private funds.

For every \$1 of CSBG, American Samoa's CAAs leveraged \$3.99 from federal, state, local, and private sources, including the value of volunteer hours.

- \$916,235 in CSBG funds were allocated in support of CAAs in American Samoa in FY20.
- Including all leveraged funds American Samoa had \$4,535,050 available to the CAA network to improve the lives of people with low incomes in FY20.

Community Action Agencies utilize CSBG funds to address specific local needs through services and programs that address one or more of the core domains in which we work: employment, education and cognitive development, income, infrastructure and asset building, housing, health and social behavioral development, and civic engagement and community involvement.

EMPLOYMENT

778 outcomes were obtained in the employment domain. This includes outcomes such as obtaining and maintaining a job, increasing income, and obtaining benefits.

EDUCATION

2,016 outcomes were obtained in the education and cognitive development domain. This includes outcomes such as improved literacy skills, school readiness, and obtaining additional education and diplomas.

HOUSING

2,890 outcomes were obtained in the housing domain. This includes outcomes such as obtaining and maintaining housing, avoiding eviction or foreclosure, and reducing energy burden.

INCOME & ASSETS

1,136 outcomes were obtained in the income and asset building domain. This includes outcomes such as maintaining a budget, opening a savings account, increasing assets and net worth, and improving financial well-being.

HEALTH

2,895 outcomes were obtained in the health and social/behavioral development domain. This includes outcomes such as increasing nutrition skills, improving physical or mental health, and living independently.

CIVIC ENGAGEMENT

479 outcomes were obtained in the civic engagement and community involvement domain. This includes outcomes such as increasing leadership skills, and improving social networks.
