## WHO WE SERVED...



### For FFY 2020:

There were 12 CAAs, serving 124,669 people with low incomes who were living in 45,572 families.

CAAs served 20,866 people who lacked healthcare, 26,435 people who reported having a disability, 14,878 senior citizens, 46,166 children living in poverty, and 1,988 veterans and active military persons.



## WHAT IS CSBG?

The Community Services Block Grant (CSBG) provides critical funding to Community Action Agencies (CAAs) to operate programs addressing the causes and conditions of poverty under three national goals:

- Goal 1** - Individuals and families with low incomes are stable and achieve economic security.
- Goal 2** - Communities where people with low incomes live are healthy and offer economic opportunity.
- Goal 3** - People with low incomes are engaged and active in building opportunities in communities.

Arizona's Community Action Agencies are centrally located to serve their communities. For maximum impact, they partnered with:

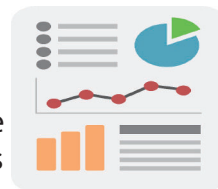
- 616 non-profits
- 751 for-profits
- 217 faith-based organizations
- 94 school districts



There were 318,189 hours of volunteer time donated to CAAs in Arizona.

## What kind of RESOURCES do CAAs have?

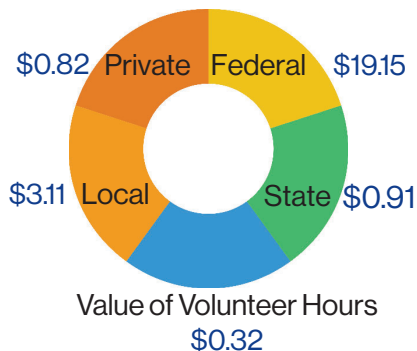
Community Action Agencies utilize a Results Oriented Management and Accountability system that is strategically designed to ensure accountability and improve performance management. In FY20, there were 3 ROMA professionals available in the network to help agencies with planning, reporting, data analysis and evaluation.



Community Action Agencies leverage several other federal, state, local, and other private funds.

For every \$1 of CSBG, Arizona's CAAs leveraged \$24.31 from federal, state, local, and private sources, including the value of volunteer hours.

- \$7,473,147 in CSBG funds were allocated in support of CAAs in Arizona in FY20.
- Including all leveraged funds Arizona had \$186,162,422 available to the CAA network to improve the lives of people with low incomes in FY20.

6 CAAs in Arizona also operate the Weatherization Assistance Program (WAP).

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Community Action Agencies utilize CSBG funds to address specific local needs through services and programs that address one or more of the core domains in which we work: employment, education and cognitive development, income, infrastructure and asset building, housing, health and social behavioral development, and civic engagement and community involvement.

## EMPLOYMENT

1,387 outcomes were obtained in the employment domain. This includes outcomes such as obtaining and maintaining a job, increasing income, and obtaining benefits.

## EDUCATION

7,653 outcomes were obtained in the education and cognitive development domain. This includes outcomes such as improved literacy skills, school readiness, and obtaining additional education and diplomas.

## HOUSING

13,631 outcomes were obtained in the housing domain. This includes outcomes such as obtaining and maintaining housing, avoiding eviction or foreclosure, and reducing energy burden.

## INCOME & ASSETS

1,309 outcomes were obtained in the income and asset building domain. This includes outcomes such as maintaining a budget, opening a savings account, increasing assets and net worth, and improving financial well-being.

## HEALTH

27,247 outcomes were obtained in the health and social/behavioral development domain. This includes outcomes such as increasing nutrition skills, improving physical or mental health, and living independently.

## CIVIC ENGAGEMENT

325 outcomes were obtained in the civic engagement and community involvement domain. This includes outcomes such as increasing leadership skills, and improving social networks.



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
