# For FFY 2020:

There were 15 CAAs, serving 233,651 people with low incomes who were living in 117,185 families.

CAAs served 10,076 people who lacked healthcare, 61,974 people who reported having a disability, 22,661 senior citizens, 57,573 children living in poverty, and 4,185 veterans and active military persons.



# WHAT IS CSBG?

The Community Services Block Grant (CSBG) provides critical funding to Community Action Agencies (CAAs) to operate programs addressing the causes and conditions of poverty under three national goals:

Arkansas' Community Action Agencies are centrally located to serve their communities. For maximum impact, they partnered with:

- 1,328 non-profits
- 1,131 for-profits
- 834 faith-based organizations
- 351 school districts

Community Action Agencies utilize a Results Oriented Management and Accountability system that is strategically designed to ensure accountability and

improve performance management. In FY20, there were 50 ROMA professionals available in the network to help agencies with planning, reporting, data analysis and evaluation.

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### Community Action Agencies leverage several other federal, state, local, and other private funds.

For every \$1 of CSBG, Arkansas' CAAs leveraged \$10.73 from federal, state, local, and private sources, including the value of volunteer hours.

- \$16,269,699 in CSBG funds were allocated in support of CAAs in Arkansas in FY20.
- Including all leveraged funds Arkansas had \$188,681,663 available to the CAA network to improve the lives of people with low incomes in FY20.

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Community Action Agencies utilize CSBG funds to address specific local needs through services and programs that address one or more of the core domains in which we work: employment, education and cognitive development, income, infrastructure and asset building, housing, health and social behavioral development, and civic engagement and community involvement.

# **EMPLOYMENT**

1,599 outcomes were obtained in the employment domain. This includes outcomes such as obtaining and maintaining a job, increasing income, and obtaining benefits.

# **EDUCATION**

23,243 outcomes were obtained in the education and cognitive development domain. This includes outcomes such as improved literacy skills, school readiness, and obtaining additional education and diplomas.

# **INCOME & ASSETS**

2,306 outcomes were obtained in the income and asset building domain. This includes outcomes such as maintaining a budget, opening a savings account, increasing assets and net worth, and improving financial well-being.



# **CIVIC ENGAGEMENT**

3,384 outcomes were obtained in the civic engagement and community involvement domain. This includes outcomes such as increasing leadership skills, and improving social networks.

# HOUSING

19,676 outcomes were obtained in the housing domain. This includes outcomes such as obtaining and maintaining housing, avoiding eviction or foreclosure, and reducing energy burden.

# HEALTH

80,486 outcomes were obtained in the health and social/behavioral development domain. This includes outcomes such as increasing nutrition skills, improving physical or mental health, and living independently.

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
