For FFY 2020:

There were 17 CAAs, serving 203,088 people with low incomes who were living in 124,875 families.


The Community Services Block Grant (CSBG) provides critical funding to Community Action Agencies (CAAs) to operate programs addressing the causes and conditions of poverty under three national goals:

Goal 1 - Individuals and families with low incomes are stable and achieve economic security.
Goal 2 - Communities where people with low incomes live are healthy and offer economic opportunity.
Goal 3 - People with low incomes are engaged and active in building opportunities in communities.

RESOURCES

Maryland's Community Action Agencies are centrally located to serve their communities. For maximum impact, they partnered with:

- 444 non-profits
- 889 for-profits
- 420 faith-based organizations
- 37 school districts



improve performance management. In FY20, there were 16 ROMA professionals available in the network to help agencies with planning, reporting, data analysis and evaluation.



There were 281,435 hours of volunteer time donated to CAAs in Maryland.

Community Action Agencies leverage several other federal, state, local, and other private funds.

For every \$1 of CSBG, Maryland's CAAs leveraged \$7.98 from federal, state, local, and private sources, including the value of volunteer hours.

Community Action Agencies utilize CSBG funds to address specific local needs through services and programs that address one or more of the core domains in which we work: employment, education and cognitive development, income, infrastructure and asset building, housing, health and social behavioral development, and civic engagement and community involvement.

EMPLOYMENT

1,956 outcomes were obtained in the employment domain. This includes outcomes such as obtaining and maintaining a job, increasing income, and obtaining benefits.

EDUCATION

12,631 outcomes were obtained in the education and cognitive development domain. This includes outcomes such as improved literacy skills, school readiness, and obtaining additional education and diplomas.

INCOME & ASSETS

9,202 outcomes were obtained in the income and asset building domain. This includes outcomes such as maintaining a budget, opening a savings account, increasing assets and net worth, and improving financial well-being.



CIVIC ENGAGEMENT

721 outcomes were obtained in the civic engagement and community involvement domain. This includes outcomes such as increasing leadership skills, and improving social networks.

HOUSING

60,903 outcomes were obtained in the housing domain. This includes outcomes such as obtaining and maintaining housing, avoiding eviction or foreclosure, and reducing energy burden.

HEALTH

10,245 outcomes were obtained in the health and social/behavioral development domain. This includes outcomes such as increasing nutrition skills, improving physical or mental health, and living independently.
