WHO WE SERVED...



For FFY 2020:

There were 4 CAAs, serving 23,692 people with low incomes who were living in 11,150 families.

CAAs served 4,257 people who lacked healthcare. 3,890 people who reported having a disability, 2,972 senior citizens, 8,277 children living in poverty, and 662 veterans and active military persons.

The Community Services Block Grant (CSBG) provides critical funding to Community Action Agencies (CAAs) to operate programs addressing the causes and conditions of poverty under three national goals:

Goal 1 - Individuals and families with low incomes are stable and achieve economic security. Goal 2 - Communities where people with low incomes live are healthy and offer economic opportunity. Goal 3 - People with low incomes are engaged and active in building opportunities in communities.

South Dakota's Community Action Agencies are centrally located to serve their communities. For maximum impact, they partnered with:

- 340 non-profits
- 291 for-profits
- 69 faith-based organizations
- 56 school districts







There were 186,113 hours of volunteer time donated to CAAs in South Dakota.

What kind of RESOURCES

Community Action Agencies utilize a Results Oriented Management and Accountability system that is strategically designed to ensure accountability and

improve performance management. In FY20, there were 2 ROMA professionals available in the network to help agencies with planning, reporting, data analysis and evaluation.

Community Action Agencies leverage several other federal, state, local, and other private funds.

For every \$1 of CSBG, South Dakota's CAAs leveraged \$24.76 from federal, state, local, and private sources, including the value of volunteer hours.

- \$3,450,519 in CSBG funds were allocated in support of CAAs in South Dakota in FY20.

Community Action Agencies utilize CSBG funds to address specific local needs through services and programs that address one or more of the core domains in which we work: employment, education and cognitive development, income, infrastructure and asset building, housing, health and social behavioral development, and civic engagement and community involvement.

EMPLOYMENT

469 outcomes were obtained in the employment domain. This includes outcomes such as obtaining and maintaining a job, increasing income, and obtaining benefits.

EDUCATION

613 outcomes were obtained in the education and cognitive development domain. This includes outcomes such as improved literacy skills, school readiness, and obtaining additional education and diplomas.

INCOME & ASSETS

3,127 outcomes were obtained in the income and asset building domain. This includes outcomes such as maintaining a budget, opening a savings account, increasing assets and net worth, and improving financial well-being.



CIVIC ENGAGEMENT

1,323 outcomes were obtained in the civic engagement and community involvement domain. This includes outcomes such as increasing leadership skills, and improving social networks.

HOUSING

3,500 outcomes were obtained in the housing domain. This includes outcomes such as obtaining and maintaining housing, avoiding eviction or foreclosure, and reducing energy burden.

HEALTH

5,960 outcomes were obtained in the health and social/behavioral development domain. This includes outcomes such as increasing nutrition skills, improving physical or mental health, and living independently.
