WHO WE SERVED...



#### For FFY 2021:

There were 40 CAAs, serving 360,186 people with low incomes who were living in 161,504 families.

CAAs served 87,007 people who lacked healthcare, 83,221 people who reported having a disability, 51,746 senior citizens, 140,139 children living in poverty, and 4,393 veterans and active military persons.

The Community Services Block Grant (CSBG) provides critical funding to Community Action Agencies (CAAs) to operate programs addressing the causes and conditions of poverty under three national goals:

Goal 1 - Individuals and families with low incomes are stable and achieve economic security. Goal 2 - Communities where people with low incomes live are healthy and offer economic opportunity. Goal 3 - People with low incomes are engaged and active in building opportunities in communities.

Texas' Community Action Agencies are centrally located to serve their communities. For maximum impact, they partnered with:

- 1,005 non-profits
- 1,180 for-profits
- 483 faith-based organizations
- 371 school districts







There were 501,968 hours of volunteer time donated to CAAs in Texas.

### What kind of RESOURCES

Community Action Agencies utilize a Results Oriented Management and Accountability system that is strategically designed to ensure accountability and

improve performance management. In FY21, there were 62 ROMA professionals available in the network to help agencies with planning, reporting, data analysis and evaluation.

Community Action Agencies leverage several other federal, state, local, and other private funds.

For every \$1 of CSBG, Texas' CAAs leveraged \$14.87 from federal, state, local, and private sources, including the value of volunteer hours.

- \$76,360,174 in CSBG funds were allocated in support of CAAs in Texas in FY21.
- Including all leveraged funds Texas had \$1,127,953,319 available to the CAA network to improve the lives of people with low incomes in FY21.



32 CAAs in Texas also operate the Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP).



17 CAAs in Texas also operate the Weatherization Assistance Program (WAP).



17 CAAs in Texas also operate a Head Start Program.



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Community Action Agencies utilize CSBG funds to address specific local needs through services and programs that address one or more of the core domains in which we work: employment, education and cognitive development, income, infrastructure and asset building, housing, health and social behavioral development, and civic engagement and community involvement.

#### **EMPLOYMENT**

1,933 outcomes were obtained in the employment domain. This includes outcomes such as obtaining and maintaining a job, increasing income, and obtaining benefits.

#### **EDUCATION**

43,624 outcomes were obtained in the education and cognitive development domain. This includes outcomes such as improved literacy skills, school readiness, and obtaining additional education and diplomas.

#### **INCOME & ASSETS**

1,740 outcomes were obtained in the income and asset building domain. This includes outcomes such as maintaining a budget, opening a savings account, increasing assets and net worth, and improving financial well-being.



#### **CIVIC ENGAGEMENT**

1,002 outcomes were obtained in the civic engagement and community involvement domain. This includes outcomes such as increasing leadership skills, and improving social networks.

#### **HOUSING**

35,847 outcomes were obtained in the housing domain. This includes outcomes such as obtaining and maintaining housing, avoiding eviction or foreclosure, and reducing energy burden.

#### **HEALTH**

560,207 outcomes were obtained in the health and social/behavioral development domain. This includes outcomes such as increasing nutrition skills, improving physical or mental health, and living independently.

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
