#### WHO WE SERVED...



## For FFY 2021:

There were 5 CAAs, serving 38,968 people with low incomes who were living in 19,771 families.

CAAs served 3,349 people who lacked healthcare, 7,396 people who reported having a disability, 5,050 senior citizens, 9,351 children living in poverty, and 1,428 veterans and active military persons.



## WHAT IS CSBG?

The Community Services Block Grant (CSBG) provides critical funding to Community Action Agencies (CAAs) to operate programs addressing the causes and conditions of poverty under three national goals:

Vermont's Community Action Agencies are centrally located to serve their communities. For maximum impact, they partnered with:

- 352 non-profits
- 144 for-profits
- 62 faith-based organizations
- 53 school districts

Goal 2 - Communities where people with low incomes live are healthy and offer economic opportunity. Goal 3 - People with low incomes are engaged and active in building opportunities in communities.

Goal 1 - Individuals and families with low incomes are stable and achieve economic security.

# What kind of **RESOURCES** do CAAs have?

Community Action Agencies utilize a Results Oriented Management and Accountability system that is strategically designed to ensure accountability and

improve performance management. In FY21, there were 4 ROMA professionals available in the network to help agencies with planning, reporting, data analysis and evaluati

For every \$1 of CSBG, Vermont's CAAs leveraged \$10.96 from federal, state, local, and private sources, including the value of volunteer hours.



- \$3,697,035 in CSBG funds were allocated in support of CAAs in Vermont in FY21.
- Including all leveraged funds Vermont had \$93,091,318 available to the CAA network to improve the lives of people with low incomes in FY21.

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Community Action Agencies utilize CSBG funds to address specific local needs through services and programs that address one or more of the core domains in which we work: employment, education and cognitive development, income, infrastructure and asset building, housing, health and social behavioral development, and civic engagement and community involvement.

## **EMPLOYMENT**

2,164 outcomes were obtained in the employment domain. This includes outcomes such as obtaining and maintaining a job, increasing income, and obtaining benefits.

### **EDUCATION**

10,599 outcomes were obtained in the education and cognitive development domain. This includes outcomes such as improved literacy skills, school readiness, and obtaining additional education and diplomas.

## **INCOME & ASSETS**

2,977 outcomes were obtained in the income and asset building domain. This includes outcomes such as maintaining a budget, opening a savings account, increasing assets and net worth, and improving financial well-being.



## **CIVIC ENGAGEMENT**

2,200 outcomes were obtained in the civic engagement and community involvement domain. This includes outcomes such as increasing leadership skills, and improving social networks.

## HOUSING

13,413 outcomes were obtained in the housing domain. This includes outcomes such as obtaining and maintaining housing, avoiding eviction or foreclosure, and reducing energy burden.

## HEALTH

28,321 outcomes were obtained in the health and social/behavioral development domain. This includes outcomes such as increasing nutrition skills, improving physical or mental health, and living independently.

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
