


THE PURPOSE OF THE WAP

- Mission Statement of the Weatherization Assistance Program (WAP)
 - "To reduce energy costs for low-income families, particularly for the elderly, people with disabilities, and children, by improving the energy efficiency of their homes while ensuring their health and safety."

40+ Year Record of Success

- Operating since 1976
- Over 35,000 homes weatherized annually (w/ DOE funds)
- Saves low-income families an average of \$283, 18% heating reduction
- For every \$1 invested \$1.72 generated energy benefits,
 \$2.78 generated in Non-energy benefits




Consolidated Appropriations Act 2021 & Bipartisan Infrastructure Law









Created Enhancement and Innovation grant program.

Increased Administrative Cost limit to 15%. Changed the reweatherization date to a 15-year rolling date. The BIL program that allocated \$3.5 B available until expended







Legislative History

- 1980: Energy Security Act (ESA)

Authorization

Underlying statute creating the program

- Lays out Congressional intent
- Authorizes Congress to appropriate funds to the program for X amount of years
- Authorizations expire → Need reauthorization

Reauthorization

- What can be improved? What should stay the same?
- What is better addressed by DOE versus legislation?
- How can the program grow and innovate?
- Often must be part of larger bill
- Reauthorization needs passed in 2025!




Federal Statute

(b) It is, therefore, the purpose of this part [42 USCS §§ 6861 et seq.] to develop and implement a weatherization assistance program to increase the energy efficiency of dwellings owned or occupied by low-income persons, reduce their total residential energy expenditures and improve their health and safety, especially low-income persons who are particularly vulnerable such as the elderly, the handicapped, and children.

Regulations – 10 CFR 440.21

(d) Except for materials to eliminate health and safety hazards allowable under §440.18(c)(15), <u>each</u> individual weatherization material and package of weatherization materials installed in an <u>eligible dwelling unit must be cost-effective</u>...The cost of incidental repairs must be included in the cost of the package of measures installed in a dwelling.

Grant Guidance WPN 19 – 4 Energy audit processes are <u>approved by DOE every 5 years</u>. Grantees are required to submit the energy audit information to their DOE Project Officer (PO) at least six months before their previous approval expires to allow sufficient time for review and approval.

Code of Federal Regulations

- o The **Code of Federal Regulations (CFR)** is the codification of rules published in the Federal Register by the Federal government.
- Weatherization is addressed in 10 CFR 440 & 2
 CFR 200.
 - o Part 10 CFR 440 covers program matters.
 - o Part 2 CFR 200 covers financial matters.



Weatherization Program Notices (WPNs)

WAP Grant Guidance documents are issued by DOE as Weatherization Program Notices (WPN)

All WPNs are posted in Program Guidance section: https://www.energy.gov/eere/wap/weatherization-program-notices-and-memorandums

WPNs can never contradict a regulation or statute but can be adjusted to reflect changes or refinements in the program

If there will be significant changes in a new WPN, DOE will usually announce these during stakeholder meetings or national conferences


WAP Bipartisan Infrastructure Law Overview

Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL)

SEC. 40551. WEATHERIZATION ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

- (a) AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.—There is authorized to be appropriated to the Secretary for the weatherization assistance program established under part A of title IV of the Energy Conservation and Production Act (42 U.S.C. 6861 et seq.) \$3,500,000,000 for fiscal year 2022, to remain available until expended.
- (a) APPLICATION OF WAGE RATE REQUIREMENTS TO WEATHERIZATION ASSISTANCE PROGRAM.—With respect to work performed under the weatherization assistance program established under part A of title IV of the Energy Conservation and Production Act (42 U.S.C. 6861 et seq.) on a project assisted in whole or in part by funding made available under subsection (a), the requirements of section 41101 shall apply only to work performed on multifamily buildings with not fewer than 5 units.



Davis-Bacon Act as Applicable in BIL WAP


The requirement of Davis
Bacon (prevailing wage) only
applies to work performed on
multifamily buildings with 5
or more units using BIL
funding. WAP annual formula
awards are NOT subject to
DBA requirements.

Here is the process of following DBA requirements:

Subgrantee Identifies and Audits a 5+ Unit Multifamily Building



Subgrantee building is "ready to proceed to bid."



LCPTracker Software



DOE has contacted with LCPTracker, a third-party software application, to make this tracking and submission as accessible as possible. This software is free to use for all Bipartisan Infrastructure Law award recipients. LCPtracker allows for certified payroll reports and workforce data to be uploaded and electronically signed any day, any time.

DOE has created a <u>DBA website</u> to assist with compliance



Build America, Buy America

BABA requirements are only present when weatherization is being done on *public housing*, or on *privately owned buildings that serve a public function*. More information found on <u>WAP Memo</u> <u>104</u>



BABA Background

On November 15, 2021, the Build America, Buy America (BABA) Act, was enacted under Division G,
Title IX of the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA), Public Law 117–58. BABA established a
domestic content procurement preference requirement (BABA Requirement or Buy America
Requirement) to Federally funded public "infrastructure projects" with the goal of increasing a
resilient domestic supply chain and manufacturing supply for critical materials both for emerging

INTENDED USE: The Department of Energy (DOE) issues Weatherization Program Noti (WPN) to establish the framework to administer appropriated funds to the Weatherization Assistance Program (WAP). The content of this document, as well as the three attachments provides programmatic information to Weatherization Managers to develop a WAP Grante to apply for Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL) funds. These funds are appropriated by Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act, Public Law 117-58.

The WPN attachments serve as programmatic, financial, and legal resources with clarifying information on areas of the Application Instructions that must be incorporated into the subn Grantee Plan. The Grantee Plan and other elements of the WAP Grant Application Package submitted through WAP's reporting system, Performance and Accountability for Grants in Energy (PAGE).

New programmatic direction specific to the implementation of WAP formula funding from BIL is included in this WPN. While the BIL did not significantly alter the statute governing WAP, some key impacts and federal requirements are described as follows:

- **Milestone 7:** Monitoring reviews by DOE confirm acceptable performance.




PY 2022 Annual Funding Report Data Visualization


WAP Funding by Source Production Units Enhancing WAP Funding over Time









- 32 Grantees do not limit the amount of LIHEAP funds that can be expended per household.
- Of the 20 Grantees who specified a maximum LIHEAP benefit amount, the median amount is \$12,000.
