Agencies/Eligible Entities:


➤ Local Determination, Service Provision/Delivery Strategies, Agency Policies- Tripartite Board and CA CSBG Network Advisory Committee



Preparation for the Monitoring Event

- ➤ Annual Monitoring Webinar Held in October or November
- ➤ Annual Contract
 - Annual Pre-Monitoring Assessment
- ➤ Previous Desk Reviews and Follow-up (Transfer Open issues)
- ➤ Monitoring Letter with documentation Requests 45-60 days prior to Onsite monitoring (Virtual Meet with Agency to Refresh)
 - Distribution of Monitoring Tool
- ➤ Publication of State Policies/Procedures for Monitoring



- Follow-Up (Continuous Monitoring, Consecutive, Overlapping Time Periods)
- ➤ Onsite Monitoring Survey following Monitoring Event




Consistency is Critical

- Feedback both positive and constructive from SA








Post-Monitoring Efforts are Integral

States Role to track corrective action plans for progress, identify and share trends, issues, and promising practices seen in the monitoring with the Network.

In Maine, SA is contracted to do T/TA. They glean firsthand knowledge and do not need to wait for reports; can act quickly rather than later.

- Providing feedback

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
Pennsylvania

- 43 Eligible entities
 - 8 public agencies
 - 35 private non-profits (CAAs)
- Approximately \$32 million in annual allocation
- 7 CSBG State Staff
 - 2.5 program specialists responsible for monitoring and technical assistance





Risk Based Monitoring

Risk Level	Monitoring Plan Guidelines
High (250+)	A report that identifies factors that contributed to the high-risk and outlines non-compliance issues and areas that require improvement will be distributed to the agency executive director and board chairperson. The agency will be required to respond to the report with a corrective action plan within 30 days. The CSBG Program office will then work with the agency to determine a schedule for on-site monitoring and progress reporting.
Medium (150-249)	A report that identifies factors that contributed to the medium-risk score and outlines non-compliance issues and areas that require improvement will be sent to the agency executive director with a corrective action plan within 30 days. Depending on the risk score and criteria in concern, the CSBG program office will work with the agency to determine if an on-site visit is appropriate.
Low (1-149)	A report that identifies factors that contributed to the low-risk score and out lines minor non-compliance issues and areas that could be improved will be distributed to the agency executive director and board chairperson. Program specialists will continue to monitor the agency through report submissions, invoicing, and communications. The CSBG program office will discuss the risk factors to determine if any further action is needed before closing the review.

- The 3-year rule overrides risk level when planning visits.
- Visits are planned together with the agency to best utilize time with staff and board members.
- Risk based allows us to focus on specific issues.
- Site visits focus on technical assistance conversations, planning, and observing activities.
