

#### RE: Support Bipartisan Weatherization Assistance Program Reauthorization Legislation

Dear Chairman Lee, Chairman Guthrie, Ranking Member Heinrich, and Ranking Member Pallone.

On behalf of the membership of the National Association for State Community Services Programs (NASCSP), I am writing to urge you to support bipartisan legislation to reauthorize and enhance the Weatherization Assistance Program (WAP).

In the House, this legislation is entitled the Weatherization Enhancement and Readiness Act of 2025 (H.R. 1355), introduced by Reps. Tonko (D-NY-20), Lawler (R-NY-17), Kaptur (D-OH-09), Riley (D-NY-19) and Del. Moylan (R-GU-AL). In the Senate, the two-bill package consists of the Weatherization Assistance Program Improvements Act of 2025 (S. 1342) and the Energy Savings and Weatherization Reauthorization Act of 2025 (S. 2570) - both bills are sponsored by Sens. Reed (D-RI), Collins (R-ME), Coons (D-DE), and Shaheen (D-NH). The bipartisan Energy Act of 2020, signed by President Trump, authorized WAP through Fiscal Year 2025. In the face of rising energy prices, reauthorizing WAP will ensure that cost-saving program benefits continue to flow directly to the low-income households who need them most.

NASCSP is the sole national association charged with advocating for and enhancing the leadership role of States in the administration of the Weatherization Assistance Program (WAP) and the Community Services Block Grant (CSBG) across all 50 states, the District of Columbia, and the five US territories. It is in this capacity that we support this legislation and urge its passage.

As the membership association for all state WAP offices, we are deeply familiar with the impact of weatherization on families and communities nationwide. State offices are responsible for overseeing this vital federal investment and ensuring taxpayer dollars are spent effectively and in

Those living with asthma or other mold-borne illnesses spend less time emergency room and have seen their medical bills decrease by an average of \$514 per 3y retrofitting homes in need of repair, weatherization makes homes more resilient during the weather events and disasters, and the housing stock more affordable. In short, we know eatherization works.

together, H.R. 1355 and S. 1342/S. 2570 would reauthorize WAP at existing levels the 2030 – authorization currently set to expire at the end of this fiscal year. The House and packages would also authorize the vital Weatherization Readiness Fund, first funded by Year 2022 appropriations, to give state programs the flexibility to reach more low-income winers currently ineligible for funding under WAP due to their homes' structural, cal, or health-related issues. Additionally, the bills would increase the statutory Average for Unit, allowing state programs to keep up with rising costs of building materials, nent, and wages while also supporting more improvements per project for maximum savings.

#### RE: Support Adequate Funding for the Department of Energy Weatherization Assistance Program and State Energy Program

Dear Chair Collins, Vice Chair Murray, Chairman Cole, and Ranking Member DeLauro:

We, the undersigned coalition of 70 companies and weatherization stakeholders, write to urge you to support adequate Fiscal Year 2026 funding for the Department of Energy's Weatherization Assistance Program (WAP) and State Energy Program (SEP) to continue current operations and programs.

The Alliance to Save Energy (Alliance) is a leading non-profit, bipartisan and fuel-neutral energy efficiency policy organization consisting of a coalition of manufacturers, utilities, technology companies, environmental advocates, and others who are committed to advancing the role of energy efficiency in U.S. energy policy, and its value in achieving energy affordability, grid reliability, and energy security.

Since its creation in 1976, WAP has helped improve the lives of over 7.2 million low-income and rural Americans—individuals particularly susceptible to high energy burdens.\(^1\) Congress has consistently shown strong bipartisan support for this program, which enables upgrades that save households an average of \$372 or more in average annual energy costs every year.\(^2\) Every \$1\) invested in weatherization yields \$1.72\) in energy benefits, and also \$2.78\) in non-energy benefits. After participating, families have homes that are healthier and more livable; participants report decreased out-of-pocket medical expenses by an average of \$514\, as well as \$538\) in savings due to fewer missed days of work.\(^3\) The Oak Ridge National Laboratory found that the total health and household-related benefits for each weatherized unit average around \$144\). In the face of rising energy prices, providing sufficient funding for the program will ensure that these benefits continue to flow directly to consumers.

#### ERE-1 Resolution in Support of the Reauthorization and Adequate Funding for the Weatherization Assistance Program

Whereas U.S. Department of Energy's Weatherization Assistance Program (WAP) has served more than 7 million income eligible households by increasing the energy efficiency of homes, while ensuring health and safety. Weatherization investments include improved heating, ventilation and air conditioning; insulation and air sealing, lighting and appliances;

Whereas weatherization programs support 8,500 jobs, creating more energy efficient dwellings in communities across the country, increasing local employment, reducing energy costs and generating positive energy and non-energy benefits;

Whereas federal funding for weatherization is a cornerstone for supporting funding from other sources. WAP funds are often paired with state or utility efficiency programs increasing the impacts and benefits families and businesses;

Whereas U.S. Department of Energy found in 2022 through weatherization improvements and upgrades, families save an average of \$372 per year on their energy bills allowing them a better opportunity to pay future energy bills while improving the health, comfort and safety of their home;

Whereas according to Oak Ridge National Lab, low-income households carry a larger burden for energy costs typically spending 13.9% of total annual income versus 3% for other households. Low-income families often reduce spending on health care, medicine, groceries or childcare to pay energy bills;

Whereas after weatherization investments, families have homes that are more livable, resulting in fewer missed days of work and school and decreased medical expenses:

Whereas Federal Fiscal Year 2020 funding for Weatherization Assistance Program was more than \$302 million and Federal Fiscal Year 2019 funding was nearly \$277 million;

Whereas in 2019, utilities and states supplemented DOE funding by providing an additional \$844 million or \$3.04 for every dollar invested by the U.S. Department of Energy;

Whereas the WAP Weatherization Readiness Fund allows state programs to address barriers to weatherization, such as structural deficiencies, outdated wiring, or health risks like mold and asbestos, allowing more homes to qualify for WAP;

Whereas adequate appropriations for the Weatherization Readiness Fund help ensure that eligible homeowners can access WAP funds to make their households safer, healthier, and more energy efficient;

Whereas the Program is set to expire and must be reauthorized in Fiscal Year 2026 to ensure its continuous support for essential services;

Whereas the Administration has proposed elimination of the federal Weatherization Assistance Program, including the Weatherization Readiness Fund, for Fiscal Year 2026;

Whereas statutory authorization for the Weatherization Assistance Program expires at the end of this fiscal year (September 30, 2025);





#### C. Subrecipient Indirect Costs (if applicable):

The recipient must ensure its subrecipient's indirect costs are appropriately managed, have been found to be allowable, and comply with the requirements of this award and 2 CFR Part 200 as adopted and supplemented by 2 CFR Part 910.


DOE has established a maximum dollar amount that it will reimburse as indirect costs and fringe benefit costs under a financial assistance award, to include the subaward. The maximum amount of funds to be paid or reimbursed from the recipient to a subrecipient for subrecipient indirect and fringe benefit costs under a subaward will be calculated as a percentage (%) of the total subaward amount, inclusive of the Federal and non-Federal cost share amounts.


For for-profit organizations, the maximum reimbursement amount is fifteen percent (15%) of the Total Award Amount. For nonprofit organizations, the maximum reimbursement amount is 15 percent (15%) of the Total Award Amount. For state and local governments, the maximum reimbursement amount is 10 percent (10%) of the Total Award Amount.

The Total Award Amount is comprised of the Federal and any required non-Federal cost share and includes the sum of total direct costs and indirect cost amounts. The maximum indirect and fringe benefits cost reimbursement amount applies to all budget periods negotiated at the time of the award and will be adjusted should a modification change the Total Award Amount. The maximum reimbursement amount applies to the total award





#### LIHEAP State Plan Data Analysis FY 2025 Dashboard








#### 2024 NASCSP Weatherization Workforce & Wage Survey Dashboards

## The implementation of the Indirect + Fringe maximum dollar value to Total Award...

## For-Profit Organizations:

up to 15% of the Total Award Amount

## Nonprofit Organizations:

up to 15% of the Total Award Amount

## State and Local Governments:

up to 10% of the Total Award Amount

### **NEXT STEPS: Grantee Action**

Grantees must ensure the Subgrantee's indirect costs are appropriately managed, allowable, and comply with the new reimbursement limitations.

Grantees should review the "Language for Award Terms and Conditions" in <a href="Appendix 2">Appendix 2</a> of the FAL.2025-05.

Grantees must include all award flow-down requirements in Subgrantee contracts.

NASCSP Recommends Grantees to...

- Meet with your fiscal department and ensure consistent communication and implementation of the FAL2025-05 to Subgrantees.
- Communicate changes to your organization and your Fiscal and Program Monitors.
- **Inform** the Subgrantees of the FAL in writing. Consider hosting a call to explain the implementation and any potential impacts.

## Pending lawsuit...

 Nineteen states and the District of Columbia sued the Department of Energy on Friday over the agency's move to limit the use of its grant funding for "indirect costs" such as buildings, equipment and personnel.  The states noted that even House Republicans criticized the move in the <u>committee report</u> attached to their <u>fiscal 2026 Energy-Water bill</u>, which directs DOE to pause the blanket cap and negotiate new rates with each recipient.
